

Coal – Food for Juice

The southern Appalachian region has long been one of the largest sources of coal in the world. Kentucky, Virginia, Tennessee, and Oklahoma are some of the main states.

Coal use really escalated after the Civil War to fuel factories and railroads.

World War I caused the next escalation. At the highest of the coal boom, there were 12,000 mines employing over 700,000 men.

Mines in the early days were more primitive and dangerous than the more mechanized mines of today. Miners would dig and blast their way into a hillside, shoring up the walls and ceilings of the tunnels with heavy wooden timbers. They used hand drills to prepare holes to set explosive charges to dislodge the coal. Mules, and later mining cars, were employed to pull the coal from the depths of the mine shaft.

As valuable as mules were, however, they were occasionally sacrificed for the safety of the miners. As mining operations would shut down for the evening, methane gas would sometimes build up in the mine shaft overnight. To ensure that there was no gas inside, a mule would be sent into the mine first thing in the morning with an open flame on its body. When the men would hear an explosion or see a smoking mule running out of the shaft, they knew the coast was clear.

Miners were typically paid \$3 to \$5 for a 12 hour work day. Expenses such as tools, blasting powder, blacksmith services, basic utilities, or health care services were all taken out of the miners' already meager wages.

As time went on unions came in to being. Safer mining practices were put into place. Wages were raised significantly. Still, mining underground was a dangerous job.

America has plenty of coal. Its' mines produced about 900 million tons in 2015, nearly all of it destined for electricity generation, but also for export. That is only a tiny fraction of U.S. recoverable reserves, which are estimated at about 257 billion tons, enough for 200 years at the rate we are using right now. More than ¼ of the worlds' total known coal reserves are located in the U.S.

Perhaps we should consider spending money on scrubbers in smoke stacks, and finding research to make burning coal cleaner. The use of coal from the West (Wyoming) for example is far cleaner than the East. It has lower sulfur content.

If we can use the same grids for electricity we always have, it would have to be a game winner.



KIDZ ZONE

CROSS CRAFT

Make this special cross as a reminder of Jesus' death and resurrection.



What you need:

- Adult help
- Piece of wood
- 5 nails
- Hammer
- 2 balls of yarn (blue and yellow)

What you do:

- 1. Hammer the nails into the wood to form a cross shape (see example).
- 2. Tie the blue yarn to the bottom nail. Wrap it up and around the top nail and back down to the bottom nail. Then wrap it around the middle nail and around the side nails. Repeat until the yarn is wrapped about halfway up the exposed nails.
- 3. Repeat step two with the yellow yarn. Wrap it around the nails until only the heads are visible.
