



1920 - 1940

These 20 years were the years between WWI and WWII. So many advances like lights, automobiles, tractors, gas cook stoves, indoor plumbing, radios, movie theaters, no wonder they called it "the roaring 20's". As the 30's came around, all the advancements were there, but no money. Stock market crash, failed banks, a massive flood in 1927, and a never ending drought throughout most of the country through the 30's. It does not seem that long ago to be history, but 1920 is coming up on 100 years. I was reading this book I picked up for \$1.00 (paperback) from the library sale on Ft. Myers Beach. That is one thing that the island has - a new and very beautiful building for its library. A lot of my statistics are from this book.

1 – Prohibition

1920, the year started with the 18th amendment prohibiting the manufacturing, transporting, and the sale of alcoholic beverages. This amendment lasted until 1933. An overall impression was that prohibition had not worked well.

- 2 Women's Right to Vote 19th amendment
- 3 Automobiles

In 1920, 1 household in 3 possessed an automobile. By 1930 4 families in 5 owned one.

4 - Tractors

By 1920, Henry Ford had built 100,000 Fordson tractors, twice as many as the total number of tractors in use at that time. In fact, ¼ of the farm acreage had to be set aside to grow feed for the horses at that time.

5 - Electric Lights

It allowed you to start your work day earlier, read, or finish household chores with lights in the evening. Electricity was the number one thing most people yearned for in that era.

The number one appliance they wanted was an iron so they did not have to stand next to a hot stove. The order of succession was different for everyone, but the electrically powered radio and motion pictures had the greatest impact in the 20's and 30's.

6 – Self Service Grocery

You probably never thought much about this, but until 1916, the store owner got your goods off the shelf and bagged them on a counter. Clearance Sanders of Memphis, TN opened a self-serve grocery store. Named Piggly Wiggley Stores by 1920, the chain included 400 stores. By 1928, just before it was sold to Safeway and Kroger, the Piggly Wiggley chain reached 2700 stores.

7 – Healthy Diets

Before WWI, eating a lot was thought to be sensible, and being plump was regarded as a sign of good health as well as prosperity.

That all changed in the 20's with the new dresses to make you look thin, as well as the men with tighter and more styled clothing.

So much could be included, but aren't we lucky to have had all of those conveniences all of our lives – if you were born after 1940?

Q: Maybe I'm just old-fashioned, but from time to time our church's music director introduces new songs into the service, and I don't care for them. I like the old hymns, and wish he'd just stick with them. Should I complain to our pastor?

A: I know this has been a controversial issue in many churches, and I don't pretend to have all the answers, especially since I'm not particularly musical! But we have a singing faith, and God has given us the gift of music to praise Him. The Psalmist declared, "With singing lips my mouth will praise you" (Psalm 63:5).

Instead of complaining to your pastor (or anyone else), I urge you to ask God to help you be grateful for all music that points us to God, new or old. No, you may not like some of it, but others do, and God can use it in their lives to encourage them and bring them closer to Christ. Remember: The old hymns you like were once new, and someone probably didn't like them, either!

Sometimes, I'm afraid, a hymn can become so familiar to us that we sing it without even thinking about the words. But this is wrong, because then our singing becomes empty and meaningless. Don't let this happen to you, but meditate on the words of the songs you sing, and even turn them into a prayer.

Your music director has probably been wise to introduce new songs slowly; completely changing everything all at once can be disruptive. Pray for him and encourage him, letting him know that you're grateful for his gifts. Yes, let him know you appreciate the old hymns, but support him also as he seeks to reach a new generation through music.



FRUIT LADYBUGS


Get creative in the kitchen with this sweet springtime snack.

What you need:

- Strawberries (washed)
- Knife
- Plate or wax paper
- ½ cup melted chocolate chips
- Zippered baggie
- Scissors
- Blueberries (washed)
- Adult help

What you do:

- 1. De-stem the strawberries.
 Cut in half and then cut a small V atop each half to make the ladybug body.
 Set them on a plate or wax paper.
- 2. Place the melted chocolate in a baggie and cut off the tip of a bottom corner.
- 3. Pipe a dividing line and "spots" on each strawberry. Also use the chocolate to attach a blueberry "head" by the V shape.
- 4. Pipe chocolate antennas and legs onto ladybugs.
- 5. Let harden. Enjoy!
