



Decisions are What History is All About.

The history of the Wabash & Erie Canal is an interesting one, but it's sad in the fact that it was a colossal failure. The decision to build the canal was a poor one and Indiana should have gone in favor of railroad as the solution to getting goods from one place to another instead of a waterway.

On March 2, 1827, the United States Congress provided a land grant to Indiana for the construction of the Wabash & Erie Canal. The Indiana General Assembly accepted the grant on Jan. 5 the following year and appointed three commissioners.

The commissioners decided that the canal would have to extend into Ohio and petitioned the state to appoint a commission of their own. The state legislature approved the plan and new commissioners were appointed. Several legislative battles ensued by proponents of the railroad, but in the end the General Assembly approved the borrowing of \$200,000 to begin construction.

On Feb. 22, 1832, ground was broken and construction began from Toledo, Ohio to Defiance. Construction of the canal went through Fort Wayne and reached Logansport by 1837.

The Panic of 1837 devastated Indiana's program of internal improvements, but it didn't stop it completely. Construction of the canal continued and reached Delphi by 1840.

When the canal builders reached Delphi, they decided to build a dam on the Wabash near Pittsburg to replicate the water level of the glacial flow thousands of years before, so that a three -mile long wetland could be used. Thus the concept of waterway development utilizing a dam and guard lock system became the means to find a nearly "free" section of usable waterway already carved out by Mother Nature through the limestone bedrock under Delphi.

The Canal building continued past Delphi and reached Lafayette by 1843. The canal began operation the summer of 1843. Meanwhile, construction of it continued and it reached Terre Haute by 1848 and Evansville by 1853. In all, 73 locks were constructed. Lock #33 was constructed in Delphi. In the vicinity of Delphi, a total of six bridges were also constructed.

By the time it was finished, it was evident that it was not economically viable. The banks of the canal eroded rapidly and it had to be constantly dredged to be operable. The common muskrat was the worst offender to the canal as it was plentiful and would build burrows in the sides of the canal walls. Once they tunneled through the opposite side, the water quickly washed out the entire wall of the level, which rendered the canal useless until it could be repaired.

The canal was the longest ever built in North America and the second longest in the world at 468

Sections of the canal started shutting down and by 1874 the canal was closed. In 1881 vigilantes dynamited the dam in Pittsburg, leaving the paper mills in Delphi high and dry.

The canal was the longest ever built in North America and the second longest in the world at 468 miles.

The canal was dug by hand by many immigrants, who were mostly of Irish descent. About one worker died for every six feet of the canal that was dug, according to one historical marker along the route.

The state of Indiana also went bankrupt because of it. The canal cost a total of \$8,259,244.03 to build and maintain. The total receipts and revenue were \$5,477,238.41. The net loss was \$2,783,005.52 according to another historical marker.

This Mother's Day, make a bright gift for someone special in your life.




What you need:
